Since 1984, our focus has been on social and emotional development. We are a membership driven 501(c)(3) non-profit organization. Led by professionals from a variety of roles supporting infants, toddlers, and families across New Jersey, CITE is an all-volunteer organization.

What We Do

Share best practices supporting quality care measures through social media and by:

- Administering the New Jersey Infant/Toddler Credential to support provider access to six college credit hours of infant/mental health study with worksite mentoring.
- Advocating with policy makers and stakeholders to drive higher quality infant/toddler care through provider and parent education.
- Building regional professional learning communities with membership meetings.
- Convening an annual statewide infant/toddler professional development conference.
- Sponsoring the Dr. June Moss Handler Award for a provider using the New Jersey Infant/Toddler Credential to support infants and toddlers in care and to honor our co-founder.

OUR HISTORY

THE COALITION OF INFANT/TODDLER EDUCATORS (CITE) IS COMMEMORATING OUR 41ST ANNIVERSARY. WE'RE CELEBRATING BABIES AND THE EDUCATORS WHO CARE FOR THEM, AS WE HAVE SINCE 1984.

This year, as always, we take time to remember the late Dr. June Moss Handler, as much for her work shaping infancy education as for co-founding CITE. Her commitment to diversity was legendary, as was her support of social justice in both small and mighty ways. In 1962, she convinced Crayola to let go of their inappropriately named "flesh" colored crayon, and they replaced it with various shades of "peach". While June championed quality settings for all children, four decades later, we're prioritizing inclusion awareness in early care and education for all infants and toddlers; preparing a workforce capable of supporting each of them requires mind, heart, and courage from all of us.

Under Dr. Handler's leadership, CITE set the standards for the initial licensing of 466 infant/toddler care centers throughout NJ while spending four decades training hundreds of infant/toddler caregivers in responsive and developmentally appropriate best practices. Since our own infancy in 1984, CITE has become the lead agency in advocating for and affecting public policy for the rights of our zero to three population. Thanks to our advocacy, and targeted public funding, we are no longer alone in our work or in the infancy field in NJ and are proud to support the work and achievements of our partners.

- In collaboration with the Center for Autism and Early Childhood Mental Health (CAECMH), we're highlighting a new session in their professional formation programming. Participants will leave understanding their critical role in making early relational health everyone's business.
- In 2024, CITE has awarded over 10 New Jersey Infant/Toddler Credential certificates to infancy educators from a single program: North Hudson Community Action Corporation, Early Childhood Education Services in Hudson County. NHCAC accessed Credential coursework at Passaic County Community College (PCCC) and, leveraging their learning, achieved Grow NJ Kids quality ratings at all five of their EHS/HS programs.
- We have, through collaboration with the New Jersey Council for Young Children (NJCYC), participated in the development of the New Jersey Birth to Three Early Learning Standards (2010-2013). Our work was framed around reaching the needs of all children to support their developmental differences and finding resources when supports are needed.
- At our 2020 Virtual Conference, CITE members received bilingual versions of the Birth to Three Early Learning Standard as printable cards to use in planning play and routine care. These beautiful cards continue to help parents and educators keep busy **Building Brains from Birth to 36 Months** and are available and accessible to all child care sites at https://www.njcite.org/professional-resources/. They are also accessible with our inclusive care partner and sponsor SPAN Parent Advocacy Network.
- New Jersey now has full time Infant/Toddler Specialists Network (ITSN) available in each county engaging infant and toddler early care educators in center and home based programs in quality formation through professional development and coaching.
- Grow NJ Kids Technical Assistant Centers provide Technical Assistance Specialists to early childhood educators enrolled in NJ's quality improvement initiative, coaching and modeling towards rating achievement.

WHAT'S NEXT

There's more to be done as CITE continues to advocate to provide New Jersey's infancy workforce with no-cost or scholarship access to the necessary tiered learning from CDA and beyond. This includes, at minimum, earning the *New Jersey Infant/Toddler Credential*, the evidence-based model of supporting infants and toddlers in care. By building accessible communities of learners focused on protecting the developing infant brain through emotional readiness and respectful environments, we can arrive at quality ratings. If we focus on growing the professional abilities of our infant/toddler Neuro Architects, just as Dr. Handler first showed us, everything else will follow.

In 2013, CITE introduced the June Handler Award (JHA), which recognizes an individual who has earned the *New Jersey Infant/Toddler Credential*, demonstrates continued advocacy for infants and toddlers, and supports the professional development of others. This bi-annual award, honoring CITE's founder, is presented at our annual conference. CITE Board Members once again express thanks for the generous donations of past CITE presidents Terri Buccarelli and Barbara Kiley, with her husband, Charles Kiley, who donated in memory of Billee R. Kiley. Their generous donations fully fund the Award.

After serving more than 20 years as the President of the Southern Chapter, Elmoria Thomas has transitioned to the CITE State Board of Directors as a Member At Large. Elmoria is succeeded by Michelle Burress.

We have updated our <u>website</u> featuring each of our Chapters and creating an easily accessible space for the infant/toddler workforce to access resources. The results of our 2024 Compensation Survey can be found on the ACTION tab.

We have also listed the competency level of each of the presentations.

Level I

Individuals at this level are at the first step in the commitment to a career in early care and education; they contribute and assure the maintenance of a safe and nurturing environment in which infants and toddlers learn and develop; they learn about infants, toddlers, and their families through participation in professional development activities; and they receive ongoing supervision from someone at a higher level.

Level II

Individuals at this level consistently exhibit practices grounded in theories of growth, development, and learning; they work cooperatively with others, establish good mentoring relationships, and sometimes provide direct supervision; they have participated in formal study leading to a degree and/or certificate and have refined their knowledge through guided and reflective experiences with infants, toddlers, and families.

Level III

Individuals at this level have extensive academic preparation and experience in the field; they can be responsible for mentoring those at Levels I and II; they possess the ability to provide new resources in the development of theory and innovative practice; and they demonstrate a mastery of developmentally appropriate practices which allow them to mentor peers as well as persons at other levels.

Directions to the Lincroft Main Campus

From North or South Jersey, use the Garden State

Parkway. If you're driving down from North Jersey be sure to choose "Local Exits" lanes after the Raritan Bridge, not the "Express" lanes.

Southbound, coming from North Jersey and New York

To avoid the congestion of Exit 109-Red Bank, our standard exit, you can use Exit 114. Keep right – pay the toll -and make a right onto Red Hill Road. Then make a left at the next light onto Crawford Everett Road. (St. Catharine`s Church). Follow to the end – and at the T make a left onto Route 520 (Newman Springs Road). Head East on Route 520 past Christian Brothers Academy (on the left) and Thompson Park (on the right). Brookdale will be on your right – look for our red sign at the roundabout.

If you use Exit 109-Red Bank

At the bottom of the exit ramp, turn right onto Route 520 West (Newman Springs Road). Stay west on Route 520 about two miles; just after the town of Lincroft, Brookdale will be on your left – look for our red sign at the roundabout.

Northbound, coming from South Jersey

Use Exit 109-Red Bank and merge to the FAR left at the bottom of the Exit ramp. Make the left onto Route 520 West (Newman Springs Road). Stay west on Route 520 about two miles, through the town of Lincroft; the College entrance will be on the left.

From Western New Jersey

Take Route 33 towards the Halls Mills Road – NORTH exit. This becomes Kozloski Road; follow north `til the intersection with Route 537. Turn right and continue east on 537 unti it intersects with Route 34. Turn left onto Route 34 North. At the next traffic light, turn right onto Phalanx Road; stay on Phalanx about 3 miles. The entrance to Brookdale will be on the left after crossing the Swimming River Reservoir bridge.

From Route 18 Northbound

Exit at 15A-Wayside Road. Follow to Route 537 to Laird Road to Phalanx Road where you will see the College entrance on the left after the Reservoir.

From Route 18 Southbound

Use the Route 520 East exit and follow to the College.

Coming from some other place? Use Google Maps to get driving directions by entering the end address as 765 Newman Springs Road in Lincroft, New Jersey.

Once at Brookdale

Follow signs for SLC (Warner Student Life Center) **Parking Lot 7.** As you enter Parking Lot 7, park near the far end. The SLC is in a cluster of buildings to the LEFT as you exit the parking lot-NOT directly in front of you. Look for the BLUE Information Sign, make a right, & follow the path. When you see the gazabo, turn LEFT. The entrance to the SLC is on the left.

By Bus

NJ Transit Buses Lincroft campus

The NJ Transit buses #832 and #838 stop regularly at the Lincroft campus. The #833 bus also stops at the Lincroft campus.
